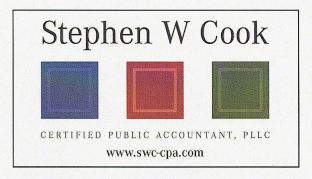

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS December 31, 2013

Using this Annual Report

Within this section of the County Line Special Utility District (the District) annual financial report, the District's management provides narrative discussion and analysis of the financial activities of the District for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2013. The District's financial performance is discussed and analyzed within the context of the accompanying financial statements and disclosure following this section. This analysis should be read in conjunction with the basic financial statements that follow this section.

OVERVIEW OF THE DISTRICT

County Line Special Utility District (the District) was created pursuant to the provision of Texas Water Code, Chapters 49 and 65 and Texas Administrative Code 293.11 and 293.12 to purchase, own, hold, lease and otherwise acquire sources of water supply; to build, operate and maintain facilities for the transportation of water; and to sell water and wastewater services to towns, cities, and other political subdivisions of this state, to private business entities and to individuals.

In order to provide the system's customers with a recognized political subdivision that would have the power needed to obtain alternative and more favorable method of financing for future improvements, County Line Water Supply Company became a Special Utility District. County Line Special Utility District was created on June 1, 2010, for financial reporting purposes.

Financial Highlights

- Total assets increased \$689,258 from \$10,693,397 in 2012 to \$11,382,655 in 2013.
- Total liabilities decreased \$62,441 to \$5,650,538.
- Total net assets increased \$751,699 to \$5,732,117.
- Total operating revenues increased \$370,515 from \$1,927,124 in 2012 to \$2,297,639 in 2013.
- Total operating expenses increased \$30,648 from \$1,146,602 in 2012 to \$1,177,250 in 2013.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis are intended to serve as an introduction the District's basic financial statements. The District's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: (1) The Statement of Net Assets which include all of the District's assets and liabilities, and provides information about the nature and amounts of investment in resources and obligations to creditors; (2) The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Net Assets show the business-type activities of the district and provides information regarding income and expense (both operating and non-operating) that affect the net assets; and (3) The Statement of Cash Flows. The primary purpose of this statement is to provide information about the District's cash receipts and cash payments during the period using the direct method of reporting cash flows from operating, investing, and capital financing activities.

Enterprise Funds

Enterprise funds (Proprietary fund) are used to report the same functions present as business-type activities in the basic financial statements County Line SUD has only one major Enterprise Fund.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements

Integral to the financial statements are the Notes to the Basic Statements. These notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the financial data provided in the basic statements. The District has prepared notes sufficient to provide the readers of these financial statements a clear picture of the District's financial position and insight into the results of its operations. comply with the standardized reporting requirements for districts by TCEQ and are in conformity with GAAP.

Statement of Net Assets

The statement of net assets for a district is similar in to the balance sheet presented as a basic financial statement for private-sector companies. The statements of net assets include all of the district's assets and liabilities. A major function of the statement of net assets is to measure the ability of a District to meet its current and long-term obligations. The biggest difference between the statement of net assets and the private-sector balance sheet is in the reporting of the difference between total assets and total liabilities. In the balance sheet of a private-sector business, the difference between the total assets and total liabilities is a measure of the value of the business that the owners would realize if they sell their share of the business.

Instead of measuring the "owners' equity," state and local governments report he net value of "net assets" in these major categories:

- Restricted
- Temporarily Restricted
- Unrestricted
- Invested in Capital Assets, Net of Related Debt

Required Supplementary Information

In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this section also presents certain required supplemental information by TCEQ in the Texas Supplemental Schedule section which may be beneficial to the reader.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The following financial analysis section presents the condensed financial statements for the current year and prior year for comparative purposes. The Statement of Net Assets shows the overall strength of the District by measuring assets and liabilities. The District's liquidity position improved as cash levels rose. Receivables remained relatively level even though the number of meters increased. The stability in receivable indicates that the District operates with an efficient billing and collection procedure in place.

Current liabilities did increase. Most of the increase was due to an approximate \$100,000 increase in the Reserve Meter account. This is increase is good as it reflects local developer's confidence in the area's growth. County Line is located in the Austin-San Antonio Corridor which is one of the fastest growing areas in the United States. Non-current liabilities which represents the current portion of long-term debt and Investment in capital assets, net of debt which represents the long-term portion of debt both decreased. This indicates that the District took on no significant new debt during year while retiring all existing bond and note indebtedness on a timely basis.

The Statement of Revenue, Expenses, and Net Assets measures the operating efficiency of the District. Revenues rose from 2012 to 2013. This increase was expected as the District increased the number of meters served, and the billing /collections for water services remained efficient. Operating revenues consist of water sales at \$1,745,886 in 2013, new account fees at \$439,448 and installation revenues at \$112,305.

Operations costs did increase slightly. This is expected since the number of meters increased. Administrative costs remain level indicating that the District's staff size is adequate to manage the current number of meters in place. At some point, as the District increases, the staff size on both the operations and administrative sides may need to be increased. The District's management does not anticipate any changes in size in the immediate future.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors County Line Special Utility District Uhland, Texas

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business type activities of the County Line Special Utility District (CLSUD) as of and for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the County Line Special Utility District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Governmental Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, I express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinions.

Opinions

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the business-type activities of the CLSUD as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, and the changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires that the management's discussion and analysis, and budgetary comparison as listed in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to my inquiries, the financial statements, and other knowledge I obtained during my audit of the financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Supplementary Information

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the County Line Special Utility District's basic financial statements. The Texas Supplementary Information (TSI) as required by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ), the Schedule of Federal Awards, and the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as required by the Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-profit Organizations*, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part to the basic financial statements.

The Other Supplementary Information which includes the Texas Supplementary Information, the Schedule of Federal Awards, and the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs were the responsibility of management and were derived from and related directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Unless marked "Unaudited" on which we express no opinion, this information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, these reports, except those marked "Unaudited" are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. The Entity

County Line Special Utility District (the District) was created pursuant to the provision of Texas Water Code, Chapters 49 and 65 and Texas Administrative Code 293.11 and 293.12 to purchase, own, hold, lease and otherwise acquire sources of water supply; to build, operate and maintain facilities for the transportation of water; and to sell water and wastewater services to towns, cities, and other political subdivisions of this state, to private business entities and to individuals. County Line Water Supply Company was dissolved and all assets and liabilities and equity of that organization were transferred to the newly created County Line Special Utility District. This transfer took place on June 1, 2010, for financial reporting purposes.

The Board of Directors (Board), a seven member group constituting an on-going entity, is the level of government which has governance responsibilities over all activities related to providing water services within the jurisdiction of the County Line Special Utility District. Members of the Board are elected by the public; have the authority to make decisions, appoint administrators and managers, and significantly influence operations; and have the primary accountability for fiscal matters.

B. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The District's basic financial statements have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to governmental units in conjunction with the "Water District's Financial Management Guide" published by the Texas commission on environmental Quality. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standards setting body for establishing governmental accounting financial reporting principles.

The District has elected not to apply Financial Accounting Standard Board guidance issued subsequent to November 30, 1989, unless specially adopted by GASB. The District reports as a special-purpose government engaged in business-type activities.

C. Accounting Method

The financial statements of the District have been prepared on the accrual basis, whereby all revenues are recorded when earned and all expenses are recorded when they have been reduced to a legal or contractual obligation to pay.

D. Basis of Presentation

Net assets and revenue, expense, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of grantor-imposed restrictions. Net assets of the District and changes therein are classified as unrestricted net assets.

Unrestricted net assets represent the portion of expendable funds that is available for support of the operations of the District.

E. Operating and Non-operating Revenue and Expense Policy

The District distinguishes operating revenues and expenses from non-operating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services in connection with the District's principal ongoing operating activities. As business-type activities, the District's operating revenues are defined as the result of exchange transactions with those who purchase, use or directly benefit from the services provided by the District. Non-operating items include activities that have the characteristic on non-exchange transactions such as grants and contributions and other items that are defined as non-operating by GASB No. 9, Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds Governmental Entities that Use Proprietary Fund Accounting, and GASB 34, Basic Financial Statements and

Management Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments. Transactions for which cash flows are reported as capital and related financing activities, non-capital financing activities, or investing activities are reported as non-operating revenues or non-operating expense utilizing the direct method.

F. Budget

The District adopts an annual budget that differs from generally accepted accounting principles in that it includes provisions for the purchase of capital assets, payments of principal and transfer to various reserve accounts that may be required by debt covenant. The adopted budget is not a spending limitation under law but rather an operating plan.

G. Cash and Temporary Investments (Cash Equivalents)

The District's cash and temporary investments consist of cash on hand, amounts in demand deposits, and money market funds. The District classifies certificates of deposit with maturities greater than three months as investments.

H. Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gain are recognized.

I. Water Receivables

All receivables are reported at their gross value. The District uses the direct write-off method to account for bad debt. No allowance for bad debt is used. Estimated unbilled revenues for water fees have not been recognized as of the end of the year as they are considered immaterial.

J. Due From Developers/Deferred Revenues

The District has adopted a policy regarding the development of currently unimproved lots by developers. The developer purchases the District's service at the prevailing rate at the date of the agreement. The developer then pays the District approximately one-half of the total fee at the time of contract execution. These revenues are prepaid in nature because no service has been rendered, and are, therefore, categorized as deferred revenues. These revenues are recognized into income as each lot is placed in service.

The unpaid balance of the contract amount, at the time of the execution of the developer contract, is recognized as a receivable under the caption of "Due from developers".

K. Inventory

The District records purchases of inventories as expenditures, or expenses, as appropriate at the time of purchase. Inventories consist primarily of supplies and chemicals, and are recorded at cost.

L. Property, Plant and Equipment

It is the District's policy to capitalize property and equipment. The District defines property, plant and equipment as assets with an initial valued cost of \$1,000 or more, and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Property and equipment are recorded at historical cost.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the assets or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized. Improvements which add substantial life are capitalized and are depreciated over their remaining useful lives using the straight-line method as follows:

M. Amortization of SUD Conversion

The District's membership voted in 2010 and approved the conversion from its then current status to a Special Utility District under Chapter 65 of the Texas Water Code. Section 65.014 permits a Special Utility District to file a resolution with the Commission requesting that a district be created. The application was completed and SUD conversion was achieved in June of 2010.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the District capitalize the costs associated with these assets and amortize those costs over the life of the asset or loan, and not less than 60 months, respectively, rather than expensing the entire amount in the year acquired. The expense associated with this amortization appears in the basic financial statements as "Amortization."

N. Long-Term Obligations

The District reports long-term debt as liabilities in the statement of net assets. Capitalized leases are deferred and amortized over the life of the lease based on the imputed interest rate and term of the leases.

O. Employee Benefits

County Line Special Utility District provides vacation and sick leave for two of the salaried employees. Employees are allowed to accumulate vacation leave, and it is payable if the employee terminates. Sick leave may also be accumulated; however, it is not payable upon termination. An amount has been accrued for as of December 31, 2013.

P. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Q. Date of Management's Review

Subsequent events were evaluated through February 25, 2014, which is the revised report date. There were no significant subsequent events.

R. Related Party Transactions

The District policy regarding related party transactions requires all activities between the District and either Board members, staff or relatives to be disclosed and approved by the Board.

NOTE2 - CASH, TEMPORARY INVESTMENTS and INVESTMENTS

The District is required by Government Code Chapter 2256, *The Public Funds Investment Act* (the "Act") to adopt, implement, and publicize an investment policy. That policy must address the following areas: (1) safety of principal and liquidity, (2) portfolio diversification, (3) allowable investments, (4) acceptable risk levels, (5) expected rates of return, (6) maximum allowable stated maturity of portfolio investments, (7) maximum average dollar-weighted maturity allowed based on the stated maturity date for the portfolio, (8) bid solicitation preferences for certificates of deposit and, (9) stated compliance with this Investment Policy.

This Act requires an annual audit of investment practices. Audit procedures in this area conducted as part of the audit of the basic financial statements disclosed that in the areas of investment practices, management reports, and establishment of appropriate policies, the District adhered to the requirements of the Act. Additionally, investment practices of the district were in accordance with local policies.

The Act determines which investments are acceptable for the District. These may include, with certain restrictions; (1) obligations of the U.S. Treasury, certain U.S. agencies, the State of Texas, (2) certificates of deposit, (3) certain municipal securities, (4) money market savings accounts, (5) fully collateralized repurchase agreements with certain criteria, (6) bankers acceptances, (7) mutual funds, (8) investment pools, and (9) guaranteed investment contracts. The District policy authorizes all the State allowable investments. If additional types of securities are approved for investment by public funds by state statute, the District will have to amend its policy before the new investment types can be considered for investment by the District.

The District's investment officers believe that the District has complied in all material respects with the requirements of the Act and the District's investment policies.

NOTE 7 – RISK MANAGEMENT

A. General Liability

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; personal injuries; and natural disasters. The District's risk management program encompasses various means of protecting the District against loss by obtaining property, casualty, and liability coverage through commercial insurance carriers and from participation in a risk pool.

The risk of loss is covered by commercial insurance. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage. District management is not aware of any pending or alleged claims for which expected liability would exceed the policy limits of present insurance coverage. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Directors County Line Special Utility District Uhland, Texas

I have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the business-type activities of the County Line Special Utility District (CLSUD) as of and for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise CLSUD's basic financial statements, and have issued my report dated February 25, 2014.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing my audit of the financial statements, I considered CLSUD's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing my opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of CLSUD's internal control. Accordingly, I do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of CLSUD's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

My consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during my audit I did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that I consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether CLSUD's financial statements are free of material misstatement, I performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of my audit, and accordingly, I do not express such an opinion. The results of my tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be

reported under Government Auditing Standards. I noted no matters that needed to be reported to management.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of my testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require me to plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could directly and materially affect a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the District's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

I believe my audit provides a reasonable basis for my compliance opinion on the District's major programs. However, my audit does not provide a legal determination of the District's compliance.

Opinion on the Major Federal Program

In my opinion, the District complied, in all material respects, with the compliance requirements referred to above that could directly and materially affect its major federal programs for the year ended December 31, 2013.

Report in Internal control Over Compliance

The District's management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the applicable compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing my compliance audit, I considered the District's internal control over compliance with the types

requirements that could directly and materially effect on each major federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for each major federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB-Circular A-133, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, I do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over compliance.

A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

My consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. I did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that I consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.
